Discussion Guidance for Use of State-Specific Compliance and Enforcement and Outreach Planning Templates

Introduction

A framework for use by State Plant Health Directors (SPHD) and State Plant Regulatory Officials (SPRO) to establish state-specific strategies for compliance and enforcement has been developed as part of a joint initiative between Plant Protection and Quarantine (PPQ) and the National Plant Board (NPB). The framework includes a compliance strategies template to help identify the most effective compliance and enforcement tools, and an outreach and communication planning template for use by the SPHD and SPRO. This document is intended to facilitate the SPHD-SPRO dialog concerning the use of these tools. The objective of this initiative is to improve compliance with regulatory requirements in federal-state programs and build an understanding with one another and awareness among stakeholders of our respective roles in achieving compliance and safeguarding goals.

The Compliance Strategies Template

The template lists many different compliance and enforcement tools used by both the federal and state governments to address non-compliance issues. As you work through this template, the intent is to determine who is best equipped to address the non-compliant issue, PPQ or the State. With each incident different tools may be used. Examples of non-compliant issues that might trigger the use of this template include but are not limited to:

- A noticeable decrease in compliance in a specific program area
- Recurring non-compliance in a specific program area
- Stakeholder misconception leading to non-compliance
- Non-compliance with a new or modified quarantine
- Non-compliance discovered during a routine compliance visit (field inspection, facility inspection, etc.)
- Unknown compliance
- Non-compliance due to a lack of knowledge

As you work through this template, also consider these overarching questions:

- Is this a low, medium, or high priority?
- What is the risk to agriculture and natural resources?
- Can this be resolved at the SPHD/SPRO level?
- How long will it take to complete the chosen action? Is this an acceptable length of time?
- Who, if anyone, should be informed or engaged at a higher level?
- Does it affect another state (or other states)? If so, has the SPHD and/or SPRO of the affected state or states been engaged?
- Are there other Federal, state, or local entities or other organizations that should be engaged? What is their role?
- What is the desired outcome?

There is no right or wrong way to complete the template. The template is a tool designed to facilitate open dialogue between the SPHD and SPRO to assist in developing a state specific strategy to address a non-complaint issue.

The Outreach and Communication Planning Template

This template will help facilitate compliance-focused outreach, education, and communication with your stakeholders. When a non-compliance issue occurs and needs to be addressed by both the SPHD and SPRO, the first step is to identify the key elements. This template can be used to help identify those key elements and determine a course of action based on information specific to the non-compliant occurrence. The template will help the SPHD and SPRO identify the message (what needs to be communicated?), the audience, the method of communication, the roles of the SPHD, SPRO and others, and the expected outcome.

As with the template, there is no right or wrong way to complete the planning template. The template is a tool designed to facilitate open dialogue between the SPHD and SPRO to determine the best method to communicate important information to stakeholders.
